Intermediate

Pass two bills similar to HB 1267 and 1279 in the 2015 Legislative Session.

Short Term

Registering students at Western to vote at their current address and make it as accessible as possible without the two bills listed above.

The Vote Coalition has had an increase in voters registered over the last couple years and this may look to certain legislators as though students don't have an accessibility problem. But this doesn't take in account how many more students could register if the deadline was extended. This also doesn't take in account for those who are not college students who only are asked to register to vote when they get their licenses when it is renewed. This could be years after their 18* birthday and statistics show if people started voting early they are more likely to continue throughout life. These bills would make voter more accessible for everyone, college students, high school students that are 18, and young people in general.

Some potential problem with these bills is that they don't include students wishing to update their mailing address.
